## "A" is for Adaptation

The Covid 19 virus has turned our lives topsy-turvy for the past nine months, but there is one quality that has grown exponentially here at the Dominican Literacy Center, and that is our ability to adapt! Our tutors and students have made the best of a very difficult situation, ensuring that our students are still able to continue to learn to read, write and speak English in a variety of ways.

Over 60 student-tutor pairs continue to meet weekly at the Center, following new safety guidelines. 42 pairs are now having classes remotely, using online meeting programs like Zoom and phone apps. Another 62 pairs have taken a semester off and will decide whether to return in January, pending local Covid-19 positivity rates and vaccination news.

Our group activities—announcements, snack breaks, birthday parties, conversation groups—have been put on hold. Instead, we have temperature checks, hand washing and masking. The tutoring rooms are sanitized after every use. One of our tutors, Diane, tells us, "I don't have any concerns/issues related to coming into the center on a weekly basis. I feel that everyone is doing what they are supposed to be doing, and things are going great, given the circumstances we are currently dealing with."





The switch to pairs working remotely has been quite remarkable. Our dedicated tutors took on the challenge of teaching themselves and their students how to use phone apps and virtual programs like FaceTime, WhatsApp, Zoom and Google Meet. Weekly announcements are sent via email, and materials are distributed using "Pick Up" and "Drop Off" bins on the front porch.

Our tutor, Jill, says, "I just wanted to let you know that things are going really well with our virtual sessions. I'm so grateful we're able to do it this way, and I even find some teaching benefits as pronunciation clarity is even more important over a screen!"

We have made a serious effort to stay in touch with those taking a break this semester, and we have received feedback from them, as well. Linda emailed us to say, "Thanks so much for keeping in touch! I'm so happy to hear that in-person tutoring sessions are going well. If anyone can provide a secure environment, it's the DLC!" Carmen says, "Thank you for taking the time to keep us informed. I miss the warmth of the Center, and my student Angelica's happy laugh."

All of us look forward to the day when we can be together again, but we are grateful that we have been able to adapt our learning community to today's needs. We are so thankful to have such amazing and determined women be part of our Center. We are truly blessed.

## **Rosalina Magana**

For many years, Rosalina Magana dreamed of becoming a U.S. citizen. She and her husband have been in the United States since 1999, and when Rosalina became eligible to apply for U.S. citizenship, she quickly enrolled in the Dominican Literacy Center citizenship classes. The most difficult thing, she found, was learning to read, write and speak English, so Rosalina also registered for ESL tutoring at the Center. Finally, Rosalina received a letter from USCIS (United States Citizenship and Immigration Services), scheduling her for her naturalization exam in Chicago. The date was for March, 2020.

Rosalina was ready for the test. She memorized the 100 questions about U.S. history and civics, she practiced reading and writing English for the dictated section of the test, and she practiced out loud each night the 7 pages of questions and answers that could be asked that day about the information on her 22-page application form. She was as confident as she could be. Then she received a second letter from USCIS. Her appointment in Chicago was canceled, due to the Covid-19 pandemic. The Federal Building was to remain closed until further notice.

Rosalina was determined to try to remember all that she had learned, so that she would be ready when the new appointment came. Then, in May, Rosalina and her husband began having headaches,

fever and nausea. They both bone-tired, were and lost their sense of taste. They tested positive for Covid-19. Their four children were tested and they, too, were positive for the virus. The family quarantined for two weeks, and then were tested again. The results: still positive. After two more weeks of quarantine, everyone in the family finally tested negative. **Rosalina's** husband, Miguel, had been out of construction

work for a month. To pay their bills, the family used their savings, and got help from a friend. Rosalina received Walmart cards from a Covid-19 grant that the Center had received for DLC students.

Finally, Rosalina received a letter in October, 2020, telling her to appear at the Federal Building in Chicago for her citizenship test. She passed the test, and on November 3, 2020, she registered to vote, and then voted in the presidential election on the same day.

Now Rosalina is a proud, secure and healthy American citizen. Someday, when the pandemic is over, she will go home to Mexico to visit her family, whom she hasn't seen for over 20 years. It has been a long journey for Rosalina, but she persisted, and is thankful that her hard work led to her new status as a United States citizen.

# A New Way of Learning

When Maria Martinez, an ESL student, opened her book this year to learn English, she saw cartoon like drawings of people using typewriters, corded phones and outdated maps of the Soviet Union. When she opens her new book in September, 2021, she will see a whole new world, with bright photos of real people using the latest technology and engaging in life activities similar to her own.

This new ESL (English as a Second Language) curriculum called "Stand Out" will come to the Center through the generosity of the Aurora Women's Empowerment (AWE) Foundation in Aurora, IL. Formerly the YWCA, the AWE Foundation's mission is "to accelerate programs making an impact on women's economic empowerment and racial justice." Formed in 2018, the AWE Foundation's first grant of \$20,000 was given to the Dominican Literacy Center, Aurora, in spring, 2020, to upgrade the curriculum and empower the women who will be using the program, starting in 2021.

The Dominican Literacy Center is deeply grateful to the Aurora Women's Empowerment Foundation for their willingness to invest in the women who come to the Center to learn English. The partnership between the AWE Foundation and the Dominican Literacy Center will be a huge benefit to the women learning English, and to their families. Believing in and investing in our women will bear fruit in the Aurora area for many years.

The Advisory Board provides guidance and support for the many initiatives of the Dominican Literacy Center:


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"Word & Hope" is a twiceyearly newsletter of the Dominican Literacy Center, a 501c (3) nonprofit organization.
